Ferguson-Florissant and Independence branches remember Harriett Woods

Harriett died of Leukemia at age 79. She was the first woman elected to statewide office in Missouri. In 1982, she lost a close Senate race while being widely outspent. This sparked the idea for Emily's List. Short for Early Money is Like Yeast. She was a leader in National Women's Political Caucus, and founded the Institute for Policy Leadership at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. She has been an inspiration to women candidates across the country. She was so thrilled this year to be able to attend the swearing-in of Claire McCaskill, the first woman elected Senator in Missouri to her own six-year term.

Kansas City branch and the **UMKC student chapter** gave a new focus to their 100 High School Girls program this year by awarding scholarships. The scholarship application required an essay about their own experience with: volunteer or community service, overcoming adversity, academic achievements, or leadership experiences. Lisa Martin served as emcee for the event.

The girls and their families were invited to an awards ceremony and reception in Pierson Auditorium on the UMKC campus. Guest speaker Anita Parran, Associate Director of AARP and Spoken Word artist Natasha Ria El-Scari added to the program. A \$500 scholarship was awarded to each of the three finalists.

On March 1, 2007, the St. Charles AAUW honored sixteen young women from six public and two private area schools nominated by their teacher or counselor as the outstanding female senior science or math student in their high school.

AAUW members hosted a buffet supper with homemade salads and desserts for the student honorees, parents, teachers and AAUW members.

Gender Equity co-chairs Teri Brecht and Linda Dencker presided over the program. Each honoree was introduced along with her parents and teacher. The honorees had prepared short speeches that included her most influential educator or mentor, jobs and volunteer work, interests, college plans, and career path. Career plans included the medical field, research, teaching in various subject areas, youth counselor, and engineer to name a few. UM- Rolla was named as the college choice by several. Each honoree was presented with a special certificate of achievement.

This science and math recognition began in 1996 with three St. Charles schools and six honorees. Over the years it gradually expanded to eight schools and sixteen honorees. Gerry Jacobs is the St. Charles branch president.
